Aims and Objectives	 To facilitate the process where individuals and communities find healing experience and freedom from the victim and victimiser mind-set in historical context. To raise awareness both of communities and their members in taking responsibility for learning lessons of the past and shaping the future. To raise dialogue culture both on local, national, and international levels.
Process and Approach	The programme consists of projects which have a beginning and an end date We have a group of dialogue facilitators working with the healing the past method, combining it with the non-violent communication methodology. The programme is represented by experts and speakers in the area of history and facilitation. We work both at the grassroots level with the engagement of social activists to dialogues, as well as with multipliers who will disseminate positive experience in their own communities and through their projects/initiatives
